COUNCIL STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS AND OTHER REPORTS:

POLICE: Councilman Sarno, Chr.

On March 26th at approximately 2pm, officers responded to 402 Hazel for a report of a house fire. Chief Underhill, Lieutenant Wright and Officer Ostrander responded and found that the front door of the residence and surrounding wall was fully engulfed in flames which were spreading quickly up the front of the house.

Officers Wright & Ostrander quickly deployed the fire extinguishers from their patrol vehicles and knocked the fire down before it could spread further. Entrance to the home was gained via a rear door only to find the house thick with smoke. Never the less, officers entered the home and performed a search of the interior for occupants. Fortunately, the search determined that no one was in the home and the fire was isolated to the front door area.

The Fire Department responded and after determining its cause as an oversight on the homeowner's part, they pronounced the scene secure. Although there was damage to the front entrance of the home and interior smoke damage throughout, the residence was saved from extensive or catastrophic damage due to the quick actions of the officers on scene. In addition, the surrounding residents were spared any damage to their homes as well.

Chief Underhill would like to recognize the efforts of Lt James Wright and Officer Joseph Ostrander, as well as the alert residents who reported the fire by phone.

PUBLIC HEALTH: Councilwoman Cuccaro

1/ A lengthy discussion about a food establishment having recurring and non stop health safety infractions with repeated warnings. Hand washing, no gloves, improper food temperatures, also the sanitizer element in the dishwasher was not working properly

2/ They made a decision to bring this establishment back before the board for a hearing. This establishment was already closed for 2 days for past offences, so the consensus is they are not taking this as seriously as it should be taken. Food contamination is a very important issue, and how many times should they have this much difficulty keeping the establishment up to code and in compliance. I certainly know where I am not eating.

3/ Another discussion about creating an ordinance to prohibit the sale of nicotine delivery products and the sale of tobacco to persons under the age of 21. As a local ordinance Good grief we are becoming the least free nation on planet earth. Although the known effects from use are dire, and obvious. Only one person spoke up in response to this ordinance, everyone was going to form their own opinion. but I would concur with her sentiments, with the same tried and true story people can fight in wars and not smoke.

4/ The Zika virus was discussed at length, and the department of disease control is suggesting that everyone have a care while traveling, as this is turning into a real issue being spread through mosquitoes and transferable from mother to child, a pregnant

woman to her fetus. As of this feb 1 there have not been any confirmed cases through blood transfusions, but multiple reports from transfusions in brazil are being investigated. It is also transmitted through sexual contact from men to their partners, so thank you gentleman for that very nice gift.

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection is promulgating recycling regulations to implement the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act; and
WHEREAS, the recycling regulations impose on municipalities certain requirements as a condition for applying for tonnage grants, including but not limited to, making and keeping accurate, verifiable records of materials collected and claimed by the municipality; and
WHEREAS, a resolution authorizing this municipality to apply for such tonnage grants will memorialize the commitment of this municipality to recycling and to indicate the assent of the Mayor and Council to the efforts undertaken by the municipality and the requirements contained in the Recycling Act and recycling regulations; and
WHEREAS, such a resolution should designate the individual authorized to ensure the application is properly completed and timely filed.
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Borough of Garwood that the Borough of Garwood hereby endorses the submission of the recycling tonnage grant application to the New Jersey Department of Environment Protection and designates Clint Dickson to ensure that the application is properly filed; and


Mayor Lombardo has vetoed Ordinance No. 16-02 for his reasons stated below.

I am vetoing Ordinance 16-02 because I have always been supportive of our Councilman retaining his health insurance. The statute in question has been stated many times before and I will take this stand until the law is changed. We have had two legal professional opinions state that our Councilman is entitled to health insurance, as he is grandfathered under the law.

He has a legal right to maintain his insurance through the Borough. If brought to a suit, the insurance company covering Garwood will not defend it. I cannot jeopardize, or put at risk, our community for another potential lawsuit that we cannot win, costing the taxpayers more money, for something that is obviously governed by state law.


