COUNCIL STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS AND OTHER REPORTS:

POLICE: Councilman Sarno, Chr.

On Monday July 18, 2016 three Local Juveniles were walking to Nomahegan Park in Cranford when they found \$200 cash with a deposit slip for the same amount attached. The juveniles took possession of the money and without delay, dropped it off at the Garwood Police Station reporting where they had located the money. The money was returned to Ms. Viginia L. Doherty who was elated and impressed with the good citizenship, honesty and integrity of these Garwood juveniles.

Chief Underhill reports that all three juveniles have participated and graduated from both the D.A.R.E. & G.R.E.A.T. programs taught at Lincoln School by Lieutenant Sam Rocco and Officer Scott Eriksen. Both Lt. Rocco and Officer Eriksen are proud and honored to see the fruits of their instruction come to bare in such a forthright manner. Chief Underhill would like to request that Mayor and Council formally recognize Daniel A. Majeski (12), Michael J. Delise (11) and Pantaleo Desantis (12) for their actions. They all have displayed the highest discipline, integrity and honesty, by making the right decision at this critical point in their journey through life.

On August 2nd, The Garwood Police Department participated in National Night Out held by the County at Meisel Field in Springfield. The Chief and members of the Department were on hand with the Departments Humvees and a marked unit. They demonstrated various equipment used regularly by patrol. The kids love trying to perform simple tasks while wearing the DWI simulation goggles and the adults enjoy the interaction as well.

National Night Out is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch, and is in its 33rd year. It is a locally organized campaign through which millions of Americans gather the 1st Tuesday of each August, for outdoor activities and to interact with their local law enforcement and other public safety departments. With today's climate of questioning police activities, this year's event could not have come at a better time. This was a great opportunity for the public to meet with first responders on an informal basis, to strengthen existing relationships with the public we serve.

On August 3rd, members of the Police Departments Bicycle Squad conducted a Bicycle Rodeo at the Athletic Field Complex, with the children participating in the summer recreation program. Participants had their bicycles inspected to ensure they were in proper and safe working condition. They were also instructed in bicycle safety including the rules of the road. Each participant completed a road course and demonstrated proper hand signals and safe control of their vehicle.

The Garwood Police would like to thank all the residents who have come in to visit with us this entire month of August. Unbeknownst to the Department, a local Facebook campaign was launched by resident Kathleen Patterson and her grass roots group entitled, "Good Deeds by the Heart of Women". She promoted a police appreciation week, which due to local enthusiasm, ended up being extended to the entire month. It was designed to show community support for local law enforcement in an age when national sentiment for Law Enforcement is not all positive. Many visitors brought food and / or baked goods along with handmade cards of appreciation.

Chief Underhill stresses that these are indeed tumultuous times, full of misconceptions regarding Law Enforcement's stated mission and how it is being carried out nationally. It is all about building and maintaining relationships within our communities. Law Enforcement must win and keep the confidence of those we serve, and in Garwood we strive to do this every day.

The support this community has shown for not only the Garwood Police Department but all of all of Garwood's public safety departments, is overwhelming. We want all residents to know how grateful we are for your support and that we are here for you, 24-7-365. We are proud to wear the uniform and serve the residents of Garwood.

RECREATION: Councilman Martin Chr.

The 2016 Summer Recreation Program was the best yet. It ran for six weeks at a cost of \$50.00 per child or \$10.00 per week for those who wished to pay weekly. More children signed up this year than ever before with a total of 162. The average attendance was about 100 kids per day. The program ran several trips including trips to the Turtleback Zoo and Somerset Patriots game. The summer ran smoothly under the Direction of Dana Parkhill and her seasoned staff. We ended the season without injury or incident.

On August 14th the Commission held its annual Senior Dinner at the Knights of Columbus Hall. This year a brunch was served and live music was enjoyed. Bingo was a hit with prizes donated by the Commission. Fun was had by all.

The Commission continues to build and grow relationships with groups seeking to rent the Garwood Sports and Recreation Complex. Some of valued, repeat renters include Lincoln School Middle School Sports, Westfield Soccer, B'Elite and Clark Soccer. The Field has also been used for the some of the Commission's own programs including Garwood Instructional Soccer. As always, ample time is set aside for public use. Soccer training for Garwood's youth will begin shortly for a 6 week program with two sessions from 5 to 6 and 6 to 7 on Fridays at a cost of \$25 per child. A free Garwood Instructional Field Hockey Clinic will take place for the first time this year on August 29th and 31st.

October and November crafts are being planned and scheduled. As in the past, the children will be free and adults will pay a nominal fee.

LIBRARY, MAYOR'S REPRESENTATIVE: Councilman Petruzzelli

The Freeholders presented the Grants for Children's Programming to Union County Libraries on August 18th at the Freeholder's meeting in Elizabeth. The Garwood Public Library was awarded \$7,500. The Library will use the funds as follows:

1. \$3,725 for purchase and set up of 3 New Public Computers
2. \$1,500 for Tutor.com
 - a. Tutor.com is an online service that offers, one on one tutoring in 25 subjects for grades 4 through 12.
 - b. It also offers essay review, resume and cover letter help, SAT, ACT, GED and citizenship test preparation
 - c. It can be accessed remotely on phones, tablets and home computers by all Garwood Library card holders.
3. \$2,275 for children's programing including
 - a. Mad Science Physics Olympics Assembly
 - b. You Are Who You Eat Reptile Show
 - c. Brixology a 7 week afterschool STEM engineering program
 - d. Schoolhouse Chess a 7 week afterschool program.

The Library is grateful to the Freeholders for making these programs possible. We were informed at the Freeholder's meeting that the funds provided to the Library came from County Golf fees. So, the Library would like to encourage everyone to go play a round of golf on a county course.

In other news, the Library held two computer classes this week using the new laptops donated by Adelante Alliance. The seniors met every morning for a class on computer basics that covered: how to turn on the computer, internet searches, email and word. Each afternoon, kids learned the basics of coding. Both programs were very successful and Library plans on holding more of these programs.

SCHOOL BOARD LIAISON: Councilman Sarno

The Board of Education met Tuesday August 17th at Lincoln School, where it was the last meeting of the summer before the start of the school year, which will begin Tuesday September 6th. A "grab and go" breakfast will be served beginning on Thursday October 6th as the Garwood school district has hit the prerequisite number for students receiving a free or reduced lunch and therefore breakfast must be offered to all students. Those students receiving a free or reduced lunch will be offered a full breakfast, while ALL students will have the opportunity for the "grab and go". In case anyone is wondering, New Jersey schools required to serve breakfast are those with 20 percent or more students eligible for free or reduced-price meals under the federally funded National School Lunch Program. Physical improvements have been made to the school including the painting of walls and the updating of clocks so that Lincoln School is ready for the 2016-2017 school years. I hope everyone enjoys the rest of the summer! That's all for my report.

WHEREAS, the PBA has requested the Council of the Borough of Garwood amend the fee as indicated below; and
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Borough of Garwood that the hourly rate for the hiring of police officers of the Borough of Garwood for extra-duty employment by profit making, not-for-profit and governmental entities be and hereby is amended to \$75.00 per hour for inside security, and \$75.00 per hour for outside security or traffic control and \$90.00 per hour for outside security and or traffic jobs in the Borough of Garwood, that do not give at least (3) hours of advanced notice; additionally, there shall be a \$5.00 per hour administrative fee payable to the Borough of Garwood; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that where profit making, not-for-profit and governmental entities wish to hire police officers of the Borough of Garwood for extra-duty employment, there shall be a minimum charge equal to four hours charged at the applicable hourly rates hereto established; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any additional time billed in excess of the minimum charge of four (4) hours and less than eight (8) hours shall be billed for a total of eight (8) hours, any additional time in excess of eight (8) hours, shall be billed in one (1) hour increments at the applicable hourly rate; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the contracting profit making, not-for-profit, or governmental entity must cancel any scheduled job at least two hours prior to the start of the scheduled job; if said job is not cancelled in accordance with this provision, the entity will be required to pay the minimum four hour charged hereto established; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no such hiring or work shall take place until and unless the employing entity shall have filed with the Chief of Police an appropriate certificate attesting to the existence and effectiveness of the worker's compensation coverage for all off-duty police officers in its part time employ and an acknowledgment that any police officer so employed while off-duty shall be deemed an employee of the profit making, not-for-profit, or governmental entity.
