The Regular Meeting of the Mayor and Council was held in Council Chambers and called to order at 7:50 p.m. by Mayor Lombardo. He asked all present to participate in a moment of silence, followed by a salute to the flag.

BOND ORDINANCE NO. 15-16

BOND ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE UNDERTAKING OF SEWER IMPROVEMENTS IN, BY AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF GARWOOD, IN THE COUNTY OF UNION, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$35,000 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT, TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Garwood, in the County of Union, New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The Borough of Garwood, in the County of Union, New Jersey (the "Borough"), is hereby authorized to undertake sewer improvements in, by and for the Borough, including, but not limited to, the replacement of a portion of the sanitary sewer line on Center Street (south of Willow Avenue). Said improvements shall include all work, materials and appurtenances necessary and suitable therefor.

Section 2. The sum of \$35,000 is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of making the improvements described in Section 1 hereof. Said sum so appropriated shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized and the down payment appropriated by this ordinance. Said improvements shall be made as general improvements and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefitted.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the making of such improvements (hereinafter referred to as "purpose") is not a current expense of the Borough, and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of obligations of the Borough pursuant to the Local Bond Law (Chapter 2 of Title 40A of the New Jersey Statutes Annotated, as amended; the "Local Bond Law"), and (3) the total estimated cost of said purpose is \$35,000, and (4) \$1,700 of said sum is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance said purpose, and (5) the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$33,300, and (6) the cost of said purpose, as hereinbefore stated, includes the aggregate amount of \$5,000, which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of said purpose, including architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, legal expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 20 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 4. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$1,700, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in budgets heretofore adopted for the Borough, are now available to finance said purpose. The sum of \$1,700 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purpose.

Section 5. To finance said purpose, bonds of the Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$33,300 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 6. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of the Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$33,300 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 7. Each bond anticipation note issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be dated on or about the date of its issuance, shall be payable not more than one year from its date, shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law, and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law. Each of said bond anticipation notes shall be signed by the Mayor and by a financial officer and shall be under the seal of the Borough and attested by the Municipal Clerk. Said officers are hereby authorized to execute said notes in such form as they may adopt in conformity with law. The power to determine any matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance, and also the

power to sell said notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Financial Officer who is hereby authorized to sell said notes either at one time or from time to time in the manner provided by law.

Section 8. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to its reasonable life, is a period of forty years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 9. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Municipal Clerk of the Borough, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of the Borough, as defined in Section 43 of the Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$33,300 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

Section 10. Any funds received from private parties, the County of Union, the State of New Jersey or any of their agencies or any funds received from the United States of America or any of its agencies in aid of said purpose shall be applied to the payment of the cost of said purpose or, if bond anticipation notes have been issued, to the payment of the bond anticipation notes, and the amount of bonds authorized for said purpose shall be reduced accordingly.

Section 11. The capital budget is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency therewith and the resolutions promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director, Division of Local Government Services, is on file with the Municipal Clerk and is available for public inspection.

Section 12. The Borough intends to issue the bonds or notes to finance the cost of the improvements described in Section 1 of this bond ordinance. If the Borough incurs such costs prior to the issuance of such bonds or notes, the Borough hereby states its reasonable expectation to reimburse itself for such expenditures with the proceeds of such bonds or notes in the maximum principal amount of bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance.

Section 13. The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the obligations authorized by this ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited and general obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the Borough for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds and notes, without limitation as to rate or amount.

Section 14. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 15-17

AN ORDINANCE TO ENACT ARTICLE II (JUNIOR FIREFIGHTER PROGRAM) IN CHAPTER 27 FIRE DEPARTMENT OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF GARWOOD TO ESTABLISH A JUNIOR FIREFIGHTER PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, the Borough of Garwood wishes to create a Junior Firefighter Program under the direction and request of the Garwood Fire Department and Liberty Hose Co. #1; and

WHEREAS, on May 6, 2015, Liberty Hose Co. #1, Garwood Fire Department voted unanimously to approve the implementation of a Junior Firefighter Program within the Garwood Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, the Garwood Fire Department has provided standard operating procedures for the Junior Firefighter Program; and

WHEREAS, the Fire Committee has reviewed the proposed standard operating procedures and believe it is in the best interest of the municipality to adopt an ordinance creating a Junior Firefighter Program in accordance with same; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Garwood:

SECTION 1. In Article II (Junior Firefighter Program); in Chapter 27 (Fire Department) of the Code of the Borough of Garwood is enacted to read as follows:

**ARTICLE II
JUNIOR FIREFIGHTER PROGRAM**

§27-24. Establishment

1. It is hereby established the Junior Fire Fighters Program.

§27-25. Eligibility for membership

1. No person shall be eligible for membership in the Junior Fire Fighters Program in the Borough of Garwood unless he/she is between the ages of 14 (or have started the 8th grade) – 18 years and must reside in the Borough of Garwood.
2. All persons shall be required to obtain permission to join the program from their parents or guardians. Such permission shall be in writing and acknowledged by a notary public of the State of New Jersey.

§27-26. Insurance coverage

1. Insurance coverage will be provided to the members of the Junior Fire Fighters Program pursuant to the Statewide Insurance Workmen's comp policy.
2. Coverage shall be limited to the provisions of the insurance endorsement.

§27-27. Rules and regulations governing activities of junior fire fighters; age requirement

1. The Mayor and Council of the Borough of Garwood authorizes the Garwood Fire Department to establish rules and regulations governing the activities of the junior fire fighters. Said rules and regulations shall provide for the training of the prospective members for eventual membership in the Volunteer Fire Department of the Borough of Garwood, which regulations shall further provide that no junior fire fighter shall be required to perform duties which would expose him/her to the same degree of hazard as a regular member of the Borough's Fire Department.
2. In addition to the above relating to junior fire fighters, the Borough of Garwood shall require that the minimum age for the junior program of the fire fighters shall be 14 (or started in the 8th grade) years.

§27-28. Additional department authority

1. In addition to the authority granted to the Fire Department and its board of fire officers in other sections of this ordinance, the Garwood Fire Department shall have the right to:
 - a. Adopt appropriate training guidelines for all fire fighters within the department including, without being limited to the following:
 - i. Fire Fighter 1
 - ii. Vehicle extrication training
 - iii. Blood borne pathogen training
 - iv. Driver's training
 - v. Mask fit and respiratory protection review
2. Adopt rules, regulations and requirements for implementation and management of the Junior Fire Fighter Program.

SECTION 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 3. If any portion of this ordinance shall be determined to be invalid, such determination shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of said ordinance.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon final passage and publication in accordance with law.

STREETS AND ROADS/ECOLOGY: Councilwoman Todisco, Chr.

Thank you, Mayor. In addition to their regular duties of picking up garbage twice weekly and grass and brush on Wednesdays, the DPW has been very busy the past two weeks. They are continuing to provide residential white good pickup at various times weekly. Also, they have been checking and treating reoccurring problem sewer lines for roots on a weekly basis. The DPW has been out striping crosswalks, stop bars, and intersections throughout Borough streets and parking lots. They have completed weed removal on Borough property approaching and underneath the underpass. They have also been weeding mulch beds and around the bocce ball court and water fountain at the Recreation Complex. The DPW has also removed and disposed of the old dispatch equipment from the Police Department. Repairs to the street sweeper and garbage trucks have been done in-house by the DPW. Shade tree pruning was completed at a couple of locations to address resident concerns. In preparation for the forecasted rain, they removed debris from various drainage inlets. Finally, pothole repairs were done at the 500 block of Beech, areas between Beech and Locust, Center and Locust, New Street, and Hemlock and Lexington. That's all for my report, Mayor. Council President Nierstedt commented on the work the police are doing on the console.

FIRE: Council President Nierstedt, Chr.

Thank you Mayor. On August 14, 2015, one of our firefighters sprained his ankle when he stepped off the truck while responding to a call. The firefighter was treated for his injury and released. Volunteers are covered under borough insurances for work related injuries. He is recovering and following up with care as directed by the insurance doctors.

Every Monday during summer months, the members of the Garwood Fire Department conduct training that consists of pump testing of the equipment. This training includes hooking up to a hydrant and spraying water at the Washington School grounds. The purpose of the spraying is for testing however; the children of Garwood generally show up to enjoy the cool water on hot summer nights. The last training for this summer will be next Monday, August 31, 2015. I encourage anyone interested in being cooled off to stop by for a mist. That's all for my report.

RECREATION: Councilwoman Todisco Chr.

Thank you, Mayor. I attended the last meeting of the Recreation Commission. As you already know, one member has recently resigned, so they will need a new member appointed. As I mentioned at our last meeting, this year's summer recreation program was very successful with over 100 children signed up and over 75 children attending per day. There was a counselor to child ratio of 5 to 1. The program took in \$7135 from registrations and trips. Another success was the annual senior citizen dinner. Over 50 Garwood seniors attended and had a great time. Chicken, pasta, salad, and more was served. For entertainment, there was a DJ as well as a photo booth, which was quite popular with the seniors. Additionally, seniors played bingo, name that tune, and trivia. I would like to thank all of the Recreation Commission members and Recreation Director for their hard working organizing and cooking for this event in addition to their donations of baskets for game prizes. I'd also like to thank the Columbian Club for donating the hall for this event. The Recreation Commission looks forward to hosting future events and the fall instructional soccer program. I will share dates for ceramics and more as they get closer. The instructional soccer program for children from pre-K to 1st grade will start on September 11th and run on Fridays until October 30th with two sessions; one from 5-6pm and the other from 6-7pm. The cost is \$25 per child, which includes a ball and t-shirt. The registration form is posted on the Garwood website under the Recreation Department. Finally, the Commission discussed applications for use of the Recreation Complex for this fall, which is expected to yield revenue of about \$7,000. That's all for my report, Mayor.

LIBRARY, MAYOR'S REPRESENTATIVE: Councilman Petruzzelli

The Library officially concluded its summer reading club on August 13th with a, well attended, "make your own sundae" party. All participants received prizes and enjoyed a "hero themed" photo-ops. The top reader, Stephanie Filer read more about 100 hours. She was awarded 4 tickets to Great Adventure Amusement Park.

The library is currently having a small book sale which will conclude on August 28th. Fill up a bag of books for \$5.

Union County Freeholders has awarded the library funds under the "2015, Union County Library Grant for Children's Programing" in the amount of \$400. We will use this money to fund a "Lego Club" for elementary school children at the library.

In September, the library will resume Story Time on Wednesday mornings at 10:30am, movies on Friday at 10am, and the Monday book club at 1pm. On September 8th and 15th at 11am the library will host a family friendly exercise program with Clementina Hechevarria. On September 24th, at 6:30pm, Justin Lubenow will present a workshop entitled "What Every Baby Boomer Should Know About Medicare." On the 30th local children's author, Lauren Kachnowski will be signing books at 4pm.

The Garwood Library is open Monday through Thursday from 9:00 AM to 8:00 PM; Fridays, from 9:00 AM to 4:30 PM; and beginning September 12th, the library will resume its Saturday hours of 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM.

SCHOOL BOARD LIAISON: Councilman Mathieu Reported by Councilwoman Todisco

Thank you, Mayor. Since Councilman Mathieu mentioned at our last Council meeting that he could not make the last meeting of the Board of Education, I attended the meeting until the Board broke for an executive session at the end of the meeting. It was a rather full agenda as the school year is about to start, but here are some highlights. The Board approved activity fees for this year, which they kept the same as last year at \$45 per student per middle school sport and \$120 per student for the 7th Grade trip to Stokes, which will be from September 23rd to 25th this year. They will be continuing to allow parents to have access to their children's grades throughout each marking period through the Parent Portal, which was started during last school year. In other news, they will be upgrading the lighting at Lincoln School to LED at a cost of \$140,467.50 with a 4.4 year return on investment. Additionally, the Board approved district goals, which included continuing to follow the class of 2017 in LAL through 8th grade to track achievement and individual growth, continuing to improve technology, continuing articulation with receiving district of Clark, and reviewing the special education department and programming to identify district needs. The Board extended their shared service agreement with Mountainside for Business Administrator through June 30, 2016. Also, the Board approved positions as usually done at this time of year with a couple new hires to the staff, specifically for 5th Grade Math and for Technology Coordinator. The 2015-2016 school year will officially start on September 10th for students. That's all for my report, Mayor.

Councilman Mathieu reported further and commented on a question Councilman Martin asked at the meeting about the school having both a principal and superintendent.

Councilwoman Todisco answered that Dr. Quigley holds other positions besides Superintendent.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Garwood County of Union, State of New Jersey, hereby authorize the Mayor and Municipal Clerk to sign the Indemnification Agreement with the County of Union for use of the Conservation Center for leaf disposal.

RESOLUTION NO. 15-253

WHEREAS, Senate Bill No. 2677 would amend the provisions of the current stream cleaning law that allow a county or municipality, or a designated agency thereof, to undertake certain projects that include sediment removal; and

WHEREAS, the current stream cleaning law restricts a county or municipal stream cleaning project that includes sediment removal to stream beds of 15 feet or less in average width; and

WHEREAS, under this bill, the average width of a stream bed that would be allowed to be part of any such project would be increased to 30 feet; and

WHEREAS, S-2677 would also revise the provision in the law that limits the availability of the procedure set forth in the law to a county or municipal stream cleaning project that includes sediment removal to a stream corridor to be cleaned, cleared or de-snagged of less than 500 feet in length; and

WHEREAS, under S-2677, in the case of a project undertaken by a municipality, the procedure set forth in the law would be applicable if the stream corridor to be cleaned, cleared or de-snagged is located wholly within the jurisdictional boundaries of that municipality, or in the case of a project undertaken by a county, the procedure would be applicable if the stream to be cleaned, cleared or de-snagged is either located wholly within the jurisdictional boundaries of one municipality, or less than 500 feet in length if located within more than one municipality; and

WHEREAS, these amendments, if adopted, assist counties and municipalities to quickly and economically engage in stream cleaning projects that include sediment removal activities in order to help reduce or prevent future flooding events.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Garwood in the County of Union, hereby support Senate Bill No. 2677 amending the provisions of the current stream cleaning law that allow a county or municipality, or designated agency thereof, to undertake certain stream cleaning projects that include sediment removal.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the 21st Legislative District Representatives, the Governor, the NJ League of Municipalities, the Municipal Clerks Association of NJ and Union County municipalities.
