WHEREAS, the Garwood First Aid Squad was incorporated on September 25, 1939; and,

WHEREAS, 2024 marks 85 years of dedicated service by the Garwood First Aid Squad to the Borough of Garwood and surrounding communities; and,

WHEREAS, the Garwood First Aid Squad's members respond to more than 300 calls per year; and,

WHEREAS, the Garwood First Aid Squad hosts CPR classes, blood drives, and other crucial life-saving efforts; and,

WHEREAS, the Garwood First Aid Squad hosts such events as pictures with Santa, craft fairs, and participates in a wide variety of community events such as Garwood Rocks and the annual Christmas Tree and Menorah lightings; and,

WHEREAS, the Garwood First Aid squad is regularly on stand-by at community events ready to ensure the safety of all who attend; and,

WHEREAS, the Garwood First Aid squad is a critical, vital part of the Borough of Garwood which both increases public safety and ensures a stronger community;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Mayor Jennifer Blumenstock, do hereby honor and commend the Garwood First Aid Squad and all of its members, past and present, for 85 years of exceptional service.

Reports:

Report of Borough Attorney – No report.

Report of Borough Administrator - Flooring is nearly completed in borough hall. Court offices will be closed tomorrow and possibly Monday to be completed. The shade structure at the athletic field complex is underway and should be completed within a few days. We are finalizing a few grant proposals in the next month—Community Development Block Grants for senior services programming, a TD bank grant for community events and classes, and the recreation improvement grant from the state for turf field replacement. Special thanks for our Recreation Director for her work on all three of these grants. Tree plantings funded by the Greening Union County grant were completed last week. We will begin planning for plantings in 2025 with the funds we recently received. Thank you to our Shade Tree Officer for working on these projects.

Report of Mayor Blumenstock - I want to just take a minute to discuss drone situation occurring in NJ. I have not put out any statement before regarding this because to be honest, I have no more information than what you see already being put out by our Governor. I have been involved in meetings with other Mayors held by the FAA, FBI and Homeland Security, and they continue to believe there is no danger at the present to any of NJ's residents. They have confirmed that since the tipline started they have received over 5000 calls of which about only about 200 have led to leads for investigations. Obviously, many of the sightings called in are actually planes or helicopters, or law enforcement drones. Others are lawful drones, or hobbyist drones. However, there are still sightings where they are not yet able to identify the source and the Federal government is now providing advanced technology and trained observers to our state officials so that they can work to identify those drones that our current technology is not capturing. While I think we all will concede that many of these drone sightings have legitimate sources, there is obvious concern about the ones we are not able to identify and an unknown about why there is such a sudden uptick in the number itself. I share your concern and frustration about all of this. I hope that this shared technology will now provide some answers within a few days. In terms of the latest news, where the FAA has banned drone flights over 22 NJ towns, I do not have any further information to provide on that yet. I do not know exactly why those towns were chosen versus others; the FAA has not elaborated on special security reasons. I do want to just caution everyone, while again, I understand the frustration here, I want to urge everyone not to take any measures themselves, such as sending out your own drones to go hunting or attempting to try and take out any of the drones yourselves. There have been reports of lasers being aimed at what some may believe are drones but are actually commercial planes and this is quite dangerous to pilots and passengers. So again I'm hoping with the better technology from the federal government that we have some more answers over the next few days, and I will of course update everyone when we receive anything further. I want to thank all of the Garwood residents who joined the virtual tour this past Monday with our new United States Congresswoman LaMonica McIver. For such a small town, we certainly have made our presence known. I thank the Congresswoman and her team for listening to us and taking the time to hear our concerns and desires for our district and look forward to tackling some of those issues with them. I want to remind the residents that we are still taking applications to volunteer for our Borough's committees or boards. There are so many ways to get involved, not all them require a ton of time, and every little bit makes a difference to our community. If you head onto the website under the Mayor's tab, you'll find a description of the various committees as well as the application form to send in, and of course I encourage anyone with any questions about any of the committees to get in touch with me. I want to take a moment just to thank Councilwoman Salmon for her work here on Council. We all know Council can sometimes be a thankless job, so anyone who steps up to help the Borough and volunteer deserves our appreciation. Our re-org for the 2025 year will take place on January 2nd at 7:00pm and I'd like to welcome everyone to attend and join us in celebrating the new year.

Comments from the Council:

Councilwoman Boto - I am disappointed to not be there for the last meeting of 2024. I hope everyone has a wonderful Holiday Season. I look forward to seeing you next year. To Councilwoman Salmon, thank you for your service, and best wishes in your future endeavors.

Councilman Foley – Thanked Councilwoman Salmon for her time on Council. The FDA has issued a nationwide recall on products containing Tianeptine, a substance found in items like “Neptune’s Fix,” marketed as energy enhancers. Claims about these products include that they improve brain function and treat anxiety, depression, pain, opioid use disorder, and other conditions. However, Tianeptine poses significant health risks, including serious adverse reactions resembling opioid overdoses, which do not respond to Narcan treatment.

Councilman Lazarow – Thanked Councilwoman Salmon for her service.

Councilwoman Nolde – Wished everyone Happy Holidays.

Councilwoman Salmon – Happy Holidays and thanked everyone for their kind comments

Council President Kearney - Thank you, Mayor, and a happy holiday season to everyone. Congratulations to the legendary John Nolan on his well deserved Community Spirit award, and to the Garwood First Aid Squad celebrating 85 years of service to our community. We've had some commentary in our last few meetings regarding a lawsuit by a few municipalities against the next round of Affordable Housing, mandated by a state law passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor earlier this year. I've previously stated my opposition to Garwood getting involved in this lawsuit with the comment that it's "lighting tax money on fire." To elaborate on that just a bit more, I have read the Complaint and believe it is incoherent while attempting to link the current law to constitutional issues. The courts have ruled on the issue repeatedly (and will rule on a pending motion by the state Attorney General to dismiss this suit tomorrow); affordable housing requirements will not suddenly become unconstitutional now when there was no substantive change to the existing framework the state has been using on this for a generation. While I believe our Legislature could have done much more with this law, such as adding dedicated funding for local infrastructure needed to backstop the additional services that accompany these requirements or changing the ratio of affordable units required by developers to lower overall project density while achieving the same goal, I also think the lawsuit deliberately obfuscates the readily apparent underlying issue of this entire state needing more affordable housing supply by unfairly pointing the finger at New Jersey's cities for not doing their part while trying to pit New Jersey's communities against each other. I work in the City of Elizabeth and commute there daily. I've observed new development and, more importantly, refurbishment of existing housing on a large scale there over many years, something all of our cities are doing well beyond what would be required by the latest affordable housing round were it applied to them. Instead of trying legal tricks to delay the process, every community needs to do its part to meet new housing needs responsibly, which will help make all housing affordable again for the many young families in New Jersey who are struggling immensely to afford housing in a market with prices driven up by a lack of supply. Moving forward, I'd prefer a more holistic approach to the underlying issue of needing more places for our increasing population to live, where we collaborate with neighboring towns and regionally instead of competing with who can put what on the town border, as we often see now. That won't happen if we continue to point fingers between rural, suburban, and urban communities. So, let's stop the posturing and spend our time ensuring Garwood meets its constitutional obligations and seizes an opportunity for more thoughtful development in the short window the new law provides us to do so.

COUNCIL STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS AND OTHER REPORTS:

FINANCE AND PERSONNEL: Councilman Foley, Chair – No Report

FIRE AND OEM: Councilman Lazarow, Chair - Truck-1 is back in town. All equipment and hose have been reloaded and members are going thru in-house refresher training. On 12/17 Campbell, the company who makes the truck, came to the firehouse to do a refresher training on the truck's operation. All fire truck apparatuses have had pump testing done this last week and all have passed their tests. However, they did find some issues with Engine-5 which we are awaiting details on the necessary repairs. November's training was held at the firehouse and the subject was water rescue awareness. This is the first step in the department's ongoing water rescue training which will be continuing next year. Also, the FD participated in the Borough's tree lighting, held the annual kids Christmas party at the firehouse, and completed the annual Santa Ride visits in town this past weekend. On 12/4 the FD held its election for Officers with the following officers elected: Chief-John Scalzadonna, Deputy Chief- Brent Gregory, Captain-Jimmy Gregory, Captain- Tom Gesior, Lt-Ed Lasinski, Lt - Ben Fishman, Secretary- Ed Lasinski. Finally, Deputy Chief Gregory and Chief Scalzadonna along with the help of County OEM director Mike Scanio have been able to find a company that will be coming to the firehouse in January to give Haz Mat On Scene Incident Commander classes. These classes are 32 hours in length and will be approximately \$4500.00. Once this course is completed Director Scanio has made the Union County Fire Academy available to the Garwood FD for the test as the test has to be administered at an approved facility. In addition to HMOSIC training in January the department will be performing monthly training and preparing for the impending OSHA mandates.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Councilwoman Salmon, Chair – No Report.

PUBLIC WORKS: Councilwoman Boto, Chair - In addition to their reoccurring activities, the DPW continued the leaf clean up program; began to prepare snow removal equipment; removed old office equipment from Borough Hall and assembled portable basketball hoops for the Recreation Department.

POLICE AND PUBLIC SAFETY: Council President Kearney, Chair - The Police Committee met earlier this week. Our topics included police staffing and new hires, accreditation, outstanding 2024 projects, proposed 2025 projects, Park Mobile and the paid parking program, and various proposed updates to the Borough Code, which are in progress. Despite the ongoing challenges specific to the police hiring as adjustments continue statewide to the new licensing processes, under Chief Stoffer's leadership, Garwood is seeing continued success in recruiting well-qualified officers who have brought a wealth of experience and new perspectives into our Police Department. With this in mind, we are at an inflection point in the Department where we will see steady turnover over the next few years, mainly due to retirements. I'm confident Chief Stoffer and Captain Rocco have taken the mantle of preparing the next generation of leadership for our department as seriously as they have taken hiring, ensuring we don't just fill spots they open up but get the best officers for Garwood when we do! Regarding accreditation, I'm pleased to report that our on-site inspection will occur toward the end of January. Our Chief and Captain have put a lot of time and effort into leading our officers toward this goal, not just for prestige; accreditation ensures a police department that functions well, complies with all state standards and is responsive to the public in policy and practice. The 2025 Council may need to consider additional updates to the Borough Code for the promotional process for the ranks for Sergeant, Lieutenant and Captain specific to a candidate's redress process as accreditation advances to its final stage; we have had extensive discussions in the committee on this topic, and I'm confident we will be ready to proceed with anything needed from the governing body. Wrapping up 2024, we expect the arrival of the new radio equipment discussed at the beginning of the year any day now. Thank you to the 2024 Council for their unanimous support of this project, which is essential for the safety of all our first responders in Garwood. New quotes for NextGen 9-1-1 are in progress as the state is finally ready to proceed. GPD also has Power Engage up and running; this program has several internal applications and a public-facing component that allows people who have interacted with officers on a call for service

to provide immediate and direct feedback. The Chief provided the committee with examples of feedback submitted through Power Engage, of which most of the input provided to date has been positive. On the topic of Park Mobile and paid parking, ½ a year in, we have seen over seven thousand transactions on the system, with only 80% of all planned marked spaces on the south side of town fully signed and in operation so far. We have nearly doubled the revenue projection for this project, which is a good sign as we anticipate completing all south-side signage and markings along with state approval for the North Avenue part of the plan in the 1st quarter of 2025. We have several Code updates in committee, which are in various stages of committee work or review by the Borough Attorney: dog licensing and enforcement (which I have also looped in the Health Department on), peace and good order, disorderly conduct, and trespassing, signage on utility poles, dumpsters, Center Street bike lanes, and of course several regarding paid parking. Next year's committee will hopefully complete this work and get things up for introduction early in 2025, as we've put a lot of work this year toward general cleanup of the Borough Code. I am closing my final report for 2024 with a thank you to Councilwoman Nolde and Councilman Foley. It was an absolute pleasure working on this committee with you both. I'm amazed at the volume of work we've accomplished together and grateful for your always thoughtful input. Also, thank you to Chief Stoffer. You've been a great partner and resource to us this year, and I hope the men and women of our department appreciate your going the extra mile for them and our town every day.

SCHOOL BOARD LIAISON: Council President Kearney - The Garwood Board of Education held their final meeting of 2024 this past Tuesday, the 17th. The agenda did not include items relevant to the Borough. The Board heard a presentation from the Student Council and presented certificates to Lincoln School students who achieved the honor society for the first marking period, including my own Vincent! Congratulations to my guy and the many students honored for their ongoing academic achievements; we will be in good hands one day when this generation takes the reins!

GARWOOD SENIOR CITIZEN LIAISON: Mayor Blumenstock - Our Christmas Party a few weeks ago was a great success. Once again thank you to Jennie Browne and all of those members who helped out. Our meeting today also went well, with lunch and of course bingo! Thank you to the Senir Club members and especially the Senior Club Board members for another wonderful year, which saw a nice increase in membership, some great speakers, delicious lunches even made by some of our club members themselves, and of course some very competitive games of bingo. Looking forward to next year!

SMALL BUSINESS ADVISORY LIAISON: Council President Kearney - Our Small Business Board will meet in early January next year to reorganize and elect officers for 2025. A big thank you goes out to the volunteer board members, who are mostly local busy local business owners, along with a very active retired member, for their time and effort throughout 2024, working to improve our community and support our small businesses.

BOARD OF HEALTH LIAISON: Councilman Foley - In response, the Board of Health (BOH) conducted thorough inspections in Garwood and neighboring towns under its jurisdiction. No recalled products were found during these checks. Additionally, recall notices were hand-delivered to all local businesses that sell similar products, including gas stations, grocery stores, and convenience stores, to ensure awareness and compliance. The BOH also addressed a separate recall for a product called "Diamond Shruumz." The same proactive measures were applied, including inspections and delivery of recall notices to relevant businesses, ensuring the safety and well-being of the community. He would also like to talk to Municipal Alliance to get the word out to schools and parents.

PLANNING BOARD LIAISON: Councilwoman Salmon – The Mayor updated that she attended the last Planning Board meeting. At our last meeting on the 11th, we discussed two possible changes to our code that our Planner has recommended. The first possible ordinance is to make our code compliant with our Master Plan recommendations by removing the industrial/commercial zone from the code as it does not exist anymore and is not applicable to our Master Plan. The second ordinance concerns building permits and impervious coverage, where the recommendation is to require a review of grading and drainage to prevent improper drainage into neighboring properties. In the new year, these will be referred to the Community Development Committee before coming to the full Council for possible approval. We also further discussed the fourth-round affordable housing number, which will also be discussed by Council in the new year, as we have to send the DCA a resolution by the end of the month. Our re-org for Planning Board is on January 8th.
